## **Market Commentary**

The major U.S. equity indexes finished the fourth quarter well into positive territory, trimming the extent of their losses for the full year. The market's gains were achieved in October and November, when signs that inflation had peaked alongside less hawkish commentary from U.S. Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell raised hopes that the central bank would end its interest rate hiking cycle in early 2023. Indeed, the Fed raised its benchmark overnight lending rate by a more modest 50 basis points at its mid-December meeting, leaving the federal funds rate target range at 4.25% to 4.50%. Also supporting sentiment, the Chinese government began to ease the zero-COVID policy that had weighed on global economic growth for much of 2022. However, stocks retreated into year-end as investors focused on the impact of higher rates on economic growth and corporate earnings in the coming year.

The Wilshire 4500 Completion IndexSM returned 5.32% for the quarter. Within the benchmark, 9 of 11 market sectors posted positive returns, with only communication services and information technology finishing in negative territory.

In this environment, the USAA Extended Market Index Fund posted a positive total return for the quarter, overperforming its benchmark, the Wilshire 4500 Completion IndexSM.
