Market Review

International Equities (as measured by the MSCI EAFE Index) gained 4.77% in the third quarter of 2025, continuing their advance on a combination of easing trade tensions, solid corporate earnings, and investor optimism widely attributed to interest in artificial intelligence. Japan was the top-performing EAFE region as export-oriented companies benefited from a softer Yen and a decline in United States tariff rates. Financials was the top-performing sector, with investor sentiment improving on favorable earnings reports. Small-cap companies outperformed larger-cap companies for the period, and value-oriented stocks outperformed growth within the MSCI EAFE Index. Less profitable, lower-quality companies also continued to outgain those with more consistent fundamentals.

QVS Factor Performance

The RS Global team's proprietary QVS (Quality, Valuation and Sentiment) Model evaluates over 10,000 global companies in search of the best investment opportunities. It is designed to identify companies that have the potential to consistently create shareholder value, are reasonably valued, and exhibit favorable market sentiment. The model helps us focus our resources, as we conduct additional research only on companies with the strongest model recommendations.

Stocks in the highest-ranked quintile of the model outperformed stocks ranked in the lowest quintile for the period, led by the Valuation and Sentiment factors. Overall returns were also positive in most regions, and underlying Quality, Valuation and Sentiment factor spreads were also mostly positive. Among EAFE regions, the model was strongest in Japan and Asia/Pacific ex Japan, and weaker (but still positive) in Europe and the United Kingdom.

Performance and Positioning

The Victory RS International Fund (the "Fund") returned +2.66% (Class A Shares without a sales charge) for the period, while its benchmark, the MSCI EAFE Index (net) (the "Index"), returned +4.77%.

Portfolio allocations by sector, region and country were roughly in line with the benchmark during the third quarter of 2025 and had only a modest impact on relative performance in the aggregate. Typical of our Fund, stock selection was a much more meaningful driver of relative performance, with negative stock selection in the Communication Services, Consumer Discretionary, Industrials and Information Technology sectors detracting from relative results. By contrast, stock selection was positive in the Real Estate and Financials sectors, with the latter benefiting from individual positive contributors in multiple geographies. By region, stock selection was negative in Europe and Japan, and positive in Asia/Pacific ex

Japan, particularly Australia. Country-level detractors included Denmark, Norway and France, while positive contributors included Australia, Switzerland and Spain.

Individual detractors from relative performance included Norwegian aerospace & defense company Kongsberg Gruppen ASA, Irish/Australian building materials supplier James Hardie Industries plc , and Japanese video game maker Capcom Co., I td

Positive contributors to relative performance included Japanese electrical equipment manufacturer Fuji Electric Co., Ltd., Spanish banking multinational Banco Bilbao Vizcaya Argentaria, S.A., and Dutch financial services firm ING Groep N.V.

Outlook

With equity valuations above historical averages, opinions are mixed on whether a pullback or continued appreciation is more likely in the near term. Much depends on the path of U.S. trade policy and the level of interest rates across regions. For the longer-duration companies that we tend to favor, some degree of certainty around tariffs would be constructive, as would further declines in interest rates. A rise in trade tensions and weaker labor market conditions may negatively impact economic growth. Political conflicts in eastern Europe and the Middle East may also pose economic risk beyond their regions.

The portfolio retains a neutral posture as of quarter-end, with sector and region allocations within +/-2.0% of the benchmark. We strive to be similar to the benchmark in our allocations across regions and sectors and have been even more mindful of these exposures given current volatility levels. In our view, stock selection is a more sustainable path to positive excess returns than trying to make market timing calls. To that end, we will continue to rely on our QVS model in sourcing investment ideas and to emphasize Quality in the portfolio.
